- Fire Ratings and Standards Compliance:** Labels like LSZH or OFNR indicate flammability ratings, and references to TIA/EIA or ISO standards confirm compliance .
- Distance Markings:** Some cables have length indicators printed along the jacket to track usage during installation .

Fiber Color CodesInside multi-fiber cables, individual fibers are color-coded according to the TIA-598-C standard to simplify identification during splicing, termination, and troubleshooting :

- 12-Color Sequence:** The standard sequence is Blue, Orange, Green, Brown, Slate, White, Red, Black, Yellow, Violet, Rose, Aqua. This sequence repeats for cables with more than 12 fibers, often with stripes or markers to differentiate groups .
- High-Fiber Count Cables:** For cables exceeding 12 fibers, a "Tube and Fiber" system is used. Each buffer tube is assigned a color, and fibers inside follow the 12-color sequence .
- Jacket Color:** The outer jacket color indicates fiber type: Yellow for singlemode (OS1/OS2), Orange for OM1/OM2 multimode, Aqua for OM3/OM4, and sometimes Violet for OM4 in high-de...
